Stopping for Flashing Red Lights

Please remember, drivers must stop on the street or highway 20 feet or more from any school bus that has stopped and is flashing red warning lights.

- This applies both to vehicles approaching from the rear and from the opposing lanes.
- All lanes of traffic must stop for the school bus, except in opposing lanes if the highway is divided with a center median.
- No vehicle may proceed until the bus resumes motion and has turned off the red warning lights.



• The stop arm on the bus is an added communication to other drivers, but the lack of an extended stop arm is not reason to pass a bus whose red lights are flashing.



Mindful Minute

This month's topic: Mindfulness in Our Everyday Life Resources: The Listening Game; Mindful Sits

Last month, we learned that mindfulness has the potential to build brains that are ready for learning, loving, and living. But, a common question I hear is, "how do I actually *do mindfulness?"*. The answer: in whatever way helps you feel present and aware in the moment! It might be something as simple as taking 10 slow, deep breaths to clear your head, or something that requires more patience and practice, such as meditation.

Our students learned from JusTme when he visited Meadow View for a week what mindfulness is, what mindfulness does for our brains, and how to incorporate some simple practices into life. We learned the four steps to being more mindful people:

Being Present
Being Aware
Using Our Thoughts and Emotions

If you're interested in trying to start the practice of mindfulness with your child, check out JusTme's *Mindful Sits vide*os and give one a try! Ask your child how they feel before and after--and ask yourself. You may just find that you're able to incorporate mindfulness into your daily life quite easily, and modeling this for you child is the best way to help them learn.

Happy December Otter Friends,

As you and your little Otters may have noticed, it is dipping to very low temperatures for the entire day. Our School District Policy is:

The school district provides recess to give students time to play and exercise. All students are expected to go outside during recess. It's important that parents/guardians assist their children with dressing appropriately for the day's weather. If a student needs to remain indoors when coming back to school after an illness or injury, please provide written verification from your child's health care provider. Students will stay indoors during inclement weather or when the air or wind chill temperature is at or below 0°F. The school principal will check local weather websites for temperature and wind chill factors. (Administrative Guidelines for Cold Weather - Indoor Recess Due to Extreme Cold Temperatures or Wind Chill Temperatures)

Please make sure your little Otters have all they need to stay warm (SNOW PANTS, BOOTS, SCARFS, MITTENS, HATS, ETC.). To keep some of the snow gear from getting lost, stick it in their hood or sleeve of their jackets (hats, gloves, scarfs, etc.). It would also be a good idea to have extra socks and pants kept at school for those soggy days outside.

Now that there's snow on the ground and much more to come, ask your little Otter what's been going on at the playground. The Otter Way is to keep the SNOW and WOOD CHIPS on the ground-NO SNOWBALL THROWING DUE TO INJURIES IT MAY CAUSE :) Another Otter way is TEAMWORK: so everything being built on the playground with snow is an all

school project (snowman, snowwoman, and/or forts). If there is any issues with the snow or just with a friend, little Otters can find one of the Playground Teachers in a brightly colored vest to help them out.

THIS MONTHS PLAYGROUND EXPECTATION IS: TAKING TURNS ON THE EQUIPMENT

Our Otter Way is to have a 60 second turn with the swings, tire swings, and the orange spinner. This is because we have so many little Otters that want a turn at their short recess times. It also teaches **TEAMWORK AND FAIRNESS**. Our climbing equipment does not have a time limit due to being large structures. Please talk to your little Otter/Otters regarding this expectation.

I continue to work with our secretaries on attendance. With it being a new school and a new year, please know that Our number one priority is ensuring your student's success. Research indicates that regular attendance greatly impacts academic success starting as early as preschool and continuing through high school years. Often, the number of days that students are absent accumulates without parents realizing how many days have been missed. We appreciate your support as we strive towards the common goal of maintaining a strong and positive attendance record for your child.

Spirit of Giving

Spirit of Giving sign up is now closed. If you signed up, you should be receiving a postcard shortly after December 3 with your pick up information. Saturday, December 15 is the food and gift pick up at Sunshine Supper building from 8-11. If you are unable to pick them up, please let me know and we can schedule an alternate pick up time and location. If you did not sign up for Spirit of Giving and are in need of assistance with gifts for your children, please contact me by December 10. If your children are in need of any clothing, winter coats, hats, etc. please let me know and we can coordinate support.





Each school has a hot breakfast and lunch provided and available to all students. Breakfast costs: \$1.25, and Lunch costs \$2.65. Your children may qualify for free or reduced priced meals if: the family is receiving FoodShare, are foster children under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency, are homeless, runaway or migrant, and if the family household income is at or below the limits on the federal income eligibility guide-lines.

We are now accepting gently used hats, gloves, coats, and snow pants to help build our inventory for students within the school. If interested in donating, please drop off items at the front office.

COUNSELOR CORNER

As parents, we protect and advocate for our child. From their earliest moments, we are in charge of almost all of the decisions regarding their safety and environments. As children grow older and gain independence, they start to make more decisions for themselves. We can help children make responsible choices and learn to promote their own safety. Parents and caregivers can teach children skills that will help them make good decisions, stand up for

Many parents are concerned about bullying, protecting their kids from it, and making sure their kids aren't engaging in it. But with so much talk about bullying, sometimes we call behavior "bullying" that is actually not. So how can you tell the difference? There is little doubt that bullies are not kind to others. They push, shove and call people names. But what many people do not realize is that not every unkind thing kids do constitutes **bullying**. Kids, especially young kids, are still *learning how to get along with others. They* need parents, teachers and other adults to model kindness, conflict resolution, inclusion and responsibility.

Kids will occasionally do or say something that is hurtful. And while it is important to address the behavior, it is inappropriate to label them a bully. Instead, try to distinguish between hurtful or unkind behavior (mean and/or rude) and bullying behavior.

NLL YING'

When someone says or does something *unintentionally* hurtful and they do it once, that's RUDE.

When someone says or does something *intentionally* hurtful and they do it once, that's MEAN

When someone says or does something intentionally hurtful and they keep doing iteven when you tell them to stop or show them that you're upset-that's BULLYING.

It's inevitable that situations will arise when our children will need to stand up for themselves. Parents need to help children practice talking about what happens when they are away from home so they can feel comfortable talking with adults about their safety. At Meadow View, students can talk to any trusting adult, especially their classroom teacher, Mrs. Bell (Principal), Mrs. Balzer (Associate Principal), Mrs Eyers (School Social Worker), Ms Pavela (School Psychologist), or me, Mrs Leon (School Counselor).
